Noted 106 that there was a positive net change in capital and general funds. 107 The parties discussed enterprise funds and Mr. Miles commented that they had all improved. Reviewed 108 • the net income of each fund and discussed the city's current loan and payment scheduled on the loans. 109 Talked about the cash flow statements and the interest payments on the fiber loan. Discussed the 110 • capital outlay and cash surplus. 111 • Mr. Miles went over the city's deposits and investments. 182	and noted that most of the changes that are being implemented come straight from the new State
183	Code.
184	• Mrs. Bankhead reviewed with the Council some of the major changes which included concept
185	plans not being required anymore, although if a developer wanted to submit concept plans, they
186	could. Commented that the Administrative Land Use Authority (ALUA) board would be taking
187	on more responsibilities and that the Planning Commission would have a bit less. Mrs. Bankhead
188	noted that these changes or ordinance needed to be approved by February of next year.
189	• The Council discussed some of the recommended changes that the Planning Commission is
190	proposing and agreed with those changes.
191	• Parties talked about changes that are being made to the final plat process and some of the changes
192	that are coming from the State that the city has already been doing or complying with.
193	• Council comment that most of the changes being made come straight from the state and that there
194	is not much they can do.

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213	• Reported that the municipal elections were coming up with election day being November 21 st . The
214	County, who is helping with the election, will not have the official election results until December 1 st and
215	that the City Council needs to certify the election results by Wednesday December 6 th ; which meant that
216	they would need to hold a City Council meeting on December 4 th or 5 th .
217	• Commented that after talking with Staff and Council that the Council would hold their monthly meeting
218	on Tuesday December 5 th to certify the election results and whatever other business needed to be taken
219	care of.

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223	Skarlet Bankhead (Community Development Director):
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225	• Thanked Council for their support and the appreciation they have for the staff.
226	• Reported that she is working on the moderate-income housing report that is coming due and the new
227	zoning codes.
228	• Commented that her staff is working to remind citizens of the new parking changes and times for winter
229	and making sure residents are compiling with the new codes.
230	• Indicated that the city's annual Tree Lighting event will be held on Thursday December 7 th and that
231	donations from the ornaments will being going to the Family Place this year. Also noted that depending
232	on their participation they will be holding the city's annual holiday lighting contest with residents
233 234	nominating their neighbors or homes around the city.
234	Rob Stapley (Public Works Director):
236	<u>Roo Super (Fusite Works Director).</u>
237	• He and his staff were catching up on a few projects but everything was looking good. Reported that
238	Cherrywood Drive was wrapping up and would be done soon.
239	• Noted that the well drilling has been delayed as the workers have had some mechanical failures. The
240	parties discussed the noise ordinance and recent resolution that allowed them permission to drill
241	throughout the night. The Council asked if the winter weather would postpone drilling. Mr. Stapley
242	responded that it shouldn't be as they can drill year-round.
243	• Reported that the new shop is almost complete and that it will be a great addition. They have had a few
244	plumbing issues, but everything is back on track.
245	• Parties discussed leaf pick up. Mr. Stapley responded that the city staff will go around picking up leaves
246	until they cant anymore.
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248	Ryan Snow (City Manager):
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250	• Reported that the city is working on a few grants for some of the city's upcoming projects, one being a
251	lift station that if awarded could cover 80% of the cost. Other grants they are working on include a Safe
252	Route to School grant and trail in the Edgewood area.
253	• Indicated that fiber main line installation should be completed in the next few weeks. They have run into
254	a few hiccups but have been able to resolve many of the issues. They are hoping to have the main line
255	done before winter hits.
256	• The city is finishing up the bike trails and looking into how to improve those trails in the future.
257	• Skate Park is still in the design process with construction set to start in the spring. Commented that there
258	are a lot of projects going on and getting finished up, like the pickleball courts and Zollinger trail which
259	is nearly complete. Thanked the Council for their input and support.
