Youth Council Needs You

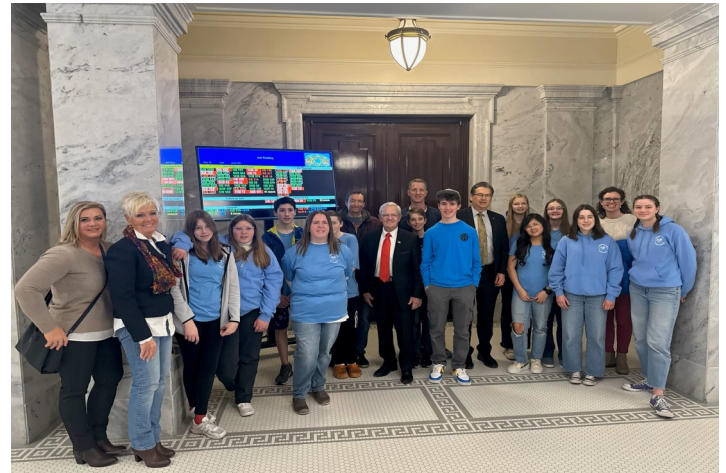
Youth Council applications are being accepted from exceptional 8th through 12th graders now through May 31. Learn more and apply on the youth council website at providencity.com/youth-council.

Spring Clean-up

We will have one roll-off dumpster for garbage and one for metal, both located in the parking lot area of our Public Works Facility, 350 East Center. We are anticipating they will be dropped off on **Friday, April 12** and removed on **Friday, May 3**.

Please do not place garbage or metal on the ground if the dumpsters are full and **tires are NOT** allowed. As the dumpsters fill, we will have them emptied and returned as quickly as possible.

Providence City will officially begin garbage collection on **Monday, April 29**. If you no longer wish to use your recycle can, please call us to cancel it. If you intentionally contaminate the recycling the **cleaning fee of \$500.00** will be billed to you. If you have any questions or concerns with cans, service or billing, please contact the public works office at (435)753-0313.

Water meter reading will begin on **Monday, April 15**. Once the lids are visible from the snow, please make sure that your entire meter lid is accessible.

Utility Rate Changes

Just a reminder as of March 1, several utility rates have increased for Providence City residents. Please note the changes below:

Sewer — \$45.00

Garbage — \$16.50

Additional Garbage Cans — \$8.25

Recycling Cans — \$6.00

Green Waste — \$8.00

Stormwater — \$7.50

Emergency 911 — \$4.00

On-Street Parking Limitations

Winter parking regulations remain in effect until April 15. On-street parking is prohibited from 1:00 a.m. – 9:00 a.m. and any time of day while snowplows are operating or while streets are snow or ice covered.

Regular parking regulations also have limitations. The following are a few of the parking activities that are prohibited:

☒ Parking a vehicle or trailer on any public road, street, alley or city property for 48 or more consecutive hours;

Parking front of a public or private driveway;

Parking on a sidewalk;

Parking on a crosswalk or within 20 feet of a crosswalk at an intersection;

Parking within 30-feet upon the approach to any . . . stop sign . . . located at the side of a roadway;

Parking on that portion of an un-laned roadway which is within 15 feet from the center of such roadway on a street not having adjacent curbs.

Sewer System

We have a few existing homes from before our initial sewer system was installed that are not able to connect to the system and still have septic tanks. For those few homes that are on septic tanks, it is important that you have your tank cleaned and inspected at least every three years. This will prevent the drain fields from contaminating groundwater.

For homes connected to our sewer system it is also appropriate to use caution with what you may put down drains or flush in toilets. For instance there are some medicines that even after the sewage passes through the treatment plant, there are still traces of certain medications that can enter and pollute water sources.

Storm Water Reminders

Friendly reminder as you start doing spring yard work to please **do not** put leaves and other yard debris in gutters so to keep storm drains working properly. As well as it is against city code to drain your sump pump into the gutter. Please do not do this, drain into your yard instead.

In the February newsletter we talked about source protection, cross connection and storm water. The type of protection might be different for different sources. What we do to protect our spring source may or may not include some of the things we do to protect our well sources. We recommended using caution when disposing of hazardous chemicals and what you may use for your lawn care. Here is a list of common items used at home that contain hazardous or toxic chemicals;

Motor oil

Pesticides

Leftover paints or paint cans

Mothballs

Flea collars

Household cleaners

A number of medicines.

If you are using pesticides and fertilizer on your lawn, please make sure to follow the label directions and then dispose of anything unused properly.
